<u>Health Update: Enterovirus-D68 Fact Sheet</u> Attached

There has been a confirmed case of Enterovirus-D68 (EV-D68) in Maine. This was confirmed by the Maine CDC on Wednesday, October 1. A fact sheet about this virus is attached to the newsletter. Please take a few minutes to read this information. There have not been any confirmed cases of EV-D68 on the Blue Hill Peninsula, but there has been viral illness in the school. We have been seeing symptoms of fever, sore throats, minor coughing, and some nausea and vomiting. I highly encourage parents to remind children to wash their hands frequently with soap & water (at least 5-6 times a day), cough and sneeze into their sleeves, and stay home when feeling sick and/or running a fever. These are the specific recommendations from the CDC regarding the prevention of EV-D68, as well as many other types of illnesses, such as colds and flu. Students with asthma, particularly, are the high risk students for developing complications from EV-D68. Please monitor your children for the signs and symptoms of EV-D68 and other illnesses. If your child is sick or running a fever, they need to stay home. Any child with these symptoms or a fever of 100 degrees or greater will be sent home. It is important to note that the CDC has informed us that hand sanitizers are not killing the EV-D68 virus. Good old-fashioned SOAP AND WATER ARE THE BEST HANDWASHING OPTION!!

Medication Policy and Cough Drops

Please do not send cough drops or any other medications to school with your child. Cough drops are available in the nurse's office. Students are not allowed to bring their own as this presents a safety risk to others and is against the School Medication Policy. When a student has a persistent cough and/or sore throat, they are sent to the nurse's office for an evaluation and, if needed, provided with a cough drop. It is very important that all children be evaluated in this manner to identify illness and to prevent the spread of illness in school. Any other medication administration in school does require a doctor's

order and completion of a medication request form. Please do not hesitate to contact the school nurse with any questions regarding the medication policy and our procedures for administering medications at school. **Strep Throat:** There has been a confirmed case of strep throat in the school. Please read the attached Strep Throat Information Sheet. School Flu Vaccine Clinics: School Union 93 schools will be conducting flu vaccine clinics the week of October 27. Flu Vaccine Information Packets will be coming home with the students on Friday, October 3. The deadline for returning the flu vaccine consent form is Friday, October 17. Please return these as soon as possible, as there is a limited supply at this time. More can be ordered in time for the clinics
